Accessing Resources for Immigrant and Latino Communities



Public Health Management Corporation's (PHMC) Housing and Justice Related Services created this resource guide to provide individuals and organizations that work with the Latino and Immigrant communities easy access to services and resources.

To meet the health, housing, education, and social service needs of the Latino and Immigrant communities, this resource guide will provide resources in the areas of: Emergency Housing, Legal and Advocacy, Arts and Culture, Children Services, Health and Human Services/Behavioral health, Elder Services, Employment and Counseling Services, Educational Services and Recreation, and Financial Services.

Emergency Housing provides emergency shelter services to people who are experiencing homelessness and those at risk of homelessness.

Legal and Advocacy provides assistance and support in legal issues regarding disability rights, human rights, immigration issues, tenant's rights, and reasonable accommodations.

Arts and Culture provides resources for immigrant and Latino families by promoting shared humanity and inclusivity through the arts.

Children Services provides resources that may be helpful to communities enrolling and providing services to immigrant children and families.

Health and Human Services/Behavioral Health provides a wide range of programs and services that aim to promote public health, provide health care services, and support human welfare.

Elder Services provides resources health and wellness services, personal assistance, senior community centers, Medicare enrollment counseling, transportation, job training, elder abuse prevention, PACE prescription assistance and more.

Employment and Counseling Services provides resources for assistance to immigrants in obtaining employment, achieving economic self-sufficiency, and adjusting socially as quickly as possible.

EMERGENCY HOUSING



Philadelphia has been an important center of sanctuary and reflects the growing diversity of American cities in recent decades. One result of this diversity is that sanctuary means different things for different immigrant, refugee, and displaced community members. For Philadelphia, Sanctuary means that shelter services are for everyone regardless of their residency or citizenship status.

Visit a City-funded homeless intake center

If you are experiencing homelessness, you can go to an intake center and get help. You can also get help if you are at risk of losing your home.

City-funded daytime intake centers are closed when a **snow emergency** is in effect. After-hours intake centers stay open 24/7 until the city lifts the snow emergency.

If you are a domestic violence survivor, you can contact Women Against Abuse any time day or night at **(866) 723-3014**.

If you are 24 and under, you can go to a youth access point.

What to expect

Assessment

You must go through a metal detector screening to enter an intake center.

At the intake center, you will complete an assessment with a social work services manager.

The social work services manager will ask for individual or household information. This may include:



- Your name.
- Birthdate.
- Social security number.
- · Family makeup.
- Race.

The social work services manager will ask for proof of identification. In some cases, they will ask for proof of guardianship for minor children. However, no household can be denied entrance into a shelter if they don't have proof of ID or guardianship.

If you can't complete the assessment during regular business hours, you can continue working on it at an after-hours center. You can also return to an intake center during regular business hours.

Additional assistance

Sometimes the assessment allows us to address additional needs, such as:

- Medical services.
- · Mental health support.
- Drug and alcohol treatment.
- · Children and youth services.
- Veteran's services.
- Legal services.
- Ongoing case management services.
- · Supportive housing for special populations.
- An optional savings program.

Case managers can also work with individuals and families to find transitional, or long-term housing.

Referral by external agencies

Case managers and social workers at institutions (such as hospitals) can refer individuals to an intake center. They must submit this **online External Agency Referral (EAR) form** or **print and fax the EAR form**.
